## How do you plan a yearlong curriculum?

## not a recipe, but a place to start

- Keep students at the center. Consider cultural positionality: What are students' assets? What are their interests? What are their learning needs? What is the community context? (SEE WESSLING HEURISTICS, pp. 93-95)
- To ensure continuity across units, think about an **overarching concept** for the course around a <u>shared purpose</u>. Determine a <u>culminating task</u> (summative assessment) for the course.
- Identify a **focus** for each unit (e.g., an essential question, theme, stance, genre, etc.). **Spiral** the units: How does one unit prepare students to be successful for the next?
- Choose the texts students will produce. Identify the objectives/goals/ standards that will guide your unit.
- Choose the texts students will read (context + fulcrum + texture): How does each text within the unit prepare students for the next? What's the "reading Velcro," as Wessling calls it?
- Determine the **formative assessments** that will lead up to it to the texts (i.e., the projects or summative assessments) that students will *produce* for each unit.

## FOCUS for 3/3

- Keep **students** at the center. Consider **cultural positionality**: What are students' <u>assets</u>? What are their <u>interests</u>? What are their <u>learning needs</u>? What is the community <u>context</u>? (SEE WESSLING HEURISTICS, pp. 93-95)
- To ensure continuity across units, think about an overarching concept for the course. What is your shared purpose?
- Determine a **culminating task** (summative assessment) for the course that will help you meet your shared purpose. Will it be <u>conventional</u> or unconventional or some combination of the 2?
